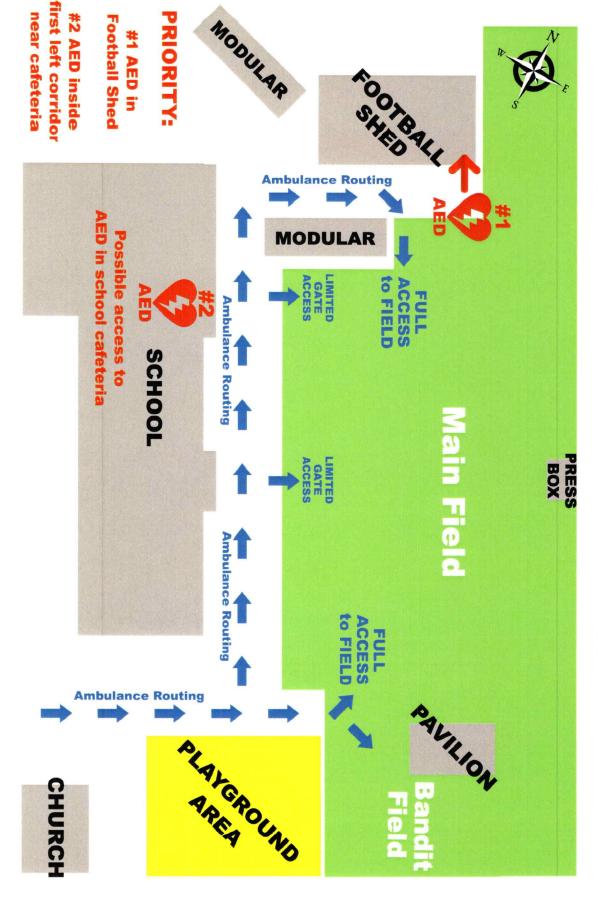

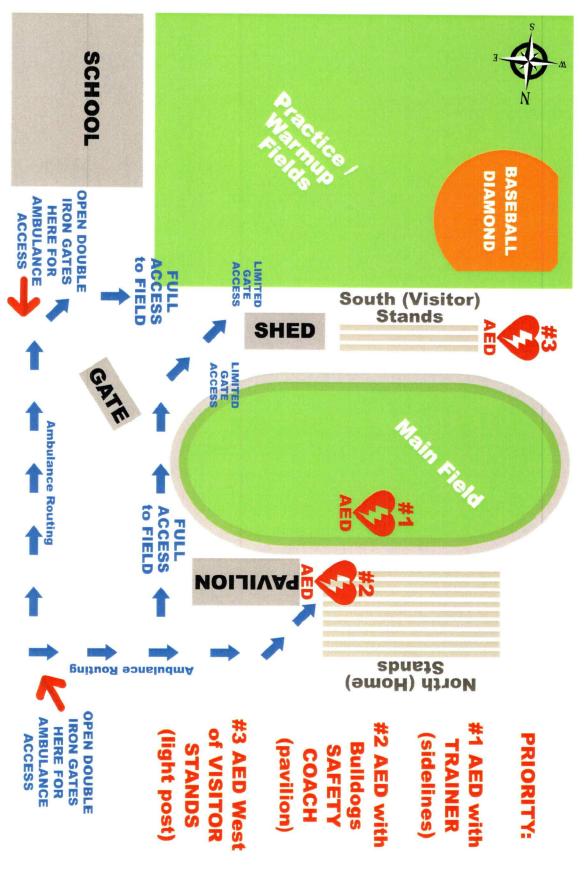

(Hand this guide off to INCIDENT COMMAND)

In any scenario, ENSURE that the SCENE IS SAFE
APPOINT volunteers to patient's IMMEDIATE NEEDS
DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE

SUDDEN CARDIAC ARREST:

- SCENE SAFETY Ensure no further hazards are present for ALL involved (patient, rescuers, onlookers)
- APPOINT one or more adult(s) to CONTROL onlookers
- APPOINT one volunteer to immediately BRING THE AED
- APPOINT one volunteer to attend and assess the patient:
- CHECK for PULSE and BREATHING
 - LOOK for chest rise & fall
 - LISTEN for breath sounds
 - FEEL for carotid and radial pulses
- NO PULSE = BEGIN CPR IMMEDIATELY!!!
- DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE
- REMOVE clothing to bare entire chest
- APPOINT one volunteer to APPLY the AED and to continue to monitor and to follow prompts
- APPOINT more volunteers to rotate CPR positions after every 2-minute interval. CPR continues until ER arrival
- DIRECT one or more volunteers to CLEAR THE ROUTE and to FLAG the ambulance directly into the scene
- COMPLY with the emergency crew's operations and ASSIST if requested. ALLOW any equipment/gear to go to hospital

Quick Reference:

HeartSine samaritan®350P/450P AED



- 1 Retrieve the AED and position yourself to one side of the patient's ribcage
- 2 Unzip front zipper, remove AED, and place the the unit near the patient's abdomen
- Unzip the back of case and dump contents (shears, razor, towel) near the AED unit for easy access
- 4 Bare the entire chest of clothing to apply pads. Use the shears on clothing if necessary
- 5 If necessary, use the towel and/or razor to get bare, dry skin for pads adhesion
- 6 Allow CPR to continue as much as possible Interrupt only when necessary
- 7 Push the ON/OFF button to power up
- 8 Pull the green tab to open pad tray
- 9 Listen to prompts as you proceed



- Apply the pads according to the diagram.

 10 Remember: "Passenger seatbelt" one pad goes on top right, one goes on bottom left of ribcage
- 11 and make sure that no one is in contact with any part of the body (timed to 2-min. intervals)
- If prompted to "PRESS SHOCK BUTTON", make sure all rescuers are clear of contact and press the flashing red heart symbol. Wait for the next prompt
- 13 Check for pulses when prompted or every 2 minutes
- 14 STOP CPR and ensure that no one is in contact with the patient for: "ANALYZING", "STAND CLEAR", and "SHOCK"
- 15 Unless "STOP CPR" is indicated, CPR should resume and must continue until the arrival of EMS personnel

In any scenario, ENSURE that the SCENE IS SAFE
APPOINT volunteers to patient's IMMEDIATE NEEDS
DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE

SUSPECTED CONCUSSION, HEAD, NECK, OR SPINAL INJURY:

- SCENE SAFETY Ensure no further hazards are present for ALL involved (patient, recuers, onlookers)
- APPOINT one or more adult(s) to CONTROL onlookers
- APPOINT one or more volunteers to IMMEDIATELY BEGIN C-SPINE STABILIZATION. Helmet STAYS ON and CANNOT BE REMOVED until cleared by qualified personnel
- Any change from normal LEVEL of CONSCIOUSNESS, at any time, qualifies as a medical emergency and requires transport to an ER
- DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE
- MAINTAIN C-SPINE STABILIZATION throughout incident. Observe and report any changes in LOC or vitals to 9-1-1 operator
- In the event of a "downgrade" from C-Spine precautions by a trainer or qualified medical personnel, the patient should be treated by the guideline, "When in doubt, sit them out". Patient should be monitored continually and if necessary, this process re-enacted. BE PREPARED!
- DIRECT one or more volunteers to CLEAR THE ROUTE and to FLAG the ambulance directly into the scene
- COMPLY with the emergency crew's operations and ASSIST if requested. ALLOW any equipment/gear to go to hospital
- ENSURE that parents, guardians, or any other relevant parties are aware of the emergency and know the ambulance destination



(Hand this guide off to INCIDENT COMMAND)

In any scenario, ENSURE that the SCENE IS SAFE APPOINT volunteers to patient's IMMEDIATE NEEDS DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE

HEAT-RELATED EMERGENCY:

- SCENE SAFETY Ensure no further hazards are present for **ALL** involved (patient, rescuers, onlookers)
- APPOINT one or more adult(s) to CONTROL onlookers
- DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE
- IMMEDIATELY REMOVE the patient from the field and RETREAT to the coolest location available (shade at the very least)
- REMEMBER: "Red & sweaty" is an URGENCY. "CHERRY RED and DRY" is a CRITICAL EMERGENCY and an immediate life threat
- DIRECT volunteers to COOL the patient's core by any means available:
 - Ice Bath
 - Ice packs to neck, armpits, and groin
 - Cool wet blanket
 - Cool running water (if a hose is available)
- A conscious patient that is breathing normally may be allowed to begin rehydrating by mouth. DO NOT ATTEMPT with anything less
- DIRECT one or more volunteers to CLEAR THE ROUTE and to FLAG the ambulance directly into the scene
- COMPLY with the emergency crew's operations and ASSIST if requested. ALLOW any equipment/gear to go to hospital
- ENSURE that parents, guardians, or any other relevant parties are aware of the emergency and know the ambulance destination

In any scenario, ENSURE that the SCENE IS SAFE
APPOINT volunteers to patient's IMMEDIATE NEEDS
DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE

OBVIOUS ARM/LEG INJURY:

FIRST! If any part of torso is involved, assume that head/neck/spine is involved and defer to that protocol

- SCENE SAFETY Ensure no further hazards are present for ALL involved (patient, rescuers, onlookers)
- APPOINT one or more adult(s) to CONTROL onlookers
- DIRECT ONE PERSON TO CALL 9-1-1 and to REMAIN ON THE LINE
- APPOINT one volunteer to immediately begin C-Spine stabilization and DO NOT STOP until ruled out by a qualified professional
- APPOINT one volunteer to manually (with hands or equipment, if available) STABILIZE an arm or leg deformity in its present position. If available, a trainer should take this position
- DO NOT REMOVE HELMET unless C-Spine protocol is followed and the threat of head/neck/spine injury has been ruled out by qualified personnel. DO NOT GUESS!
- DIRECT one or more volunteers to CLEAR THE ROUTE and to FLAG the ambulance directly into the scene
- COMPLY with the emergency crew's operations and ASSIST if requested. ALLOW any equipment/gear to go to hospital
- ENSURE that parents, guardians, or any other relevant parties are aware of the emergency and know the ambulance destination



Weather precautions & GCYL protocols:

The GCYL Inclement Weather Policy follows the current OHSAA "30-30 Rule". When lightning is witnessed from the game or practice field with a thunder report within 30 seconds, all activities shall be suspended for 30 minutes AND participants must seek shelter in a safe structure or in vehicles. All subsequent lightning and thunder events RESTART THE CLOCK until the weather event no longer affects the vicinity.

The default source for lightning strikes, tornado warnings, and other weather emergencies is the National Weather Service (NWS).

PRACTICES at Seton: Program coordinators (and/or their appointees) are in charge and will monitor weather conditions, determine when a hazard is present, and apply the "30-30 Rule" when necessary. An imminent emergency should be immediately communicated to head coaches, staff, and all parents ASAP.

HOME GAMES at Madeira HS: GCYL officials are in charge of determining hazards and are responsible for monitoring the 30-minute "safety timer". All Bulldogs staff members will defer to the decision of game officials per GCYL guidelines. An imminent emergency should be immediately communicated to head coaches, staff, and all spectators over the PA system.

As a VISITING TEAM: Defer to the GCYL officials, as in home games. If officials are not present (in the case of informal scrimmages), consult with the site host to find out if there is a protocol that includes an appropriate shelter. If the host's emergency plans or the facility's shelters are unavailable, TAKE CHARGE AND ENACT THE 30-30 RULE. Remember that when a safe structure is unavailable, vehicles can provide the next best option for shelter...see next page.

VENUES with STRIKE DETECTION and TORNADO WARNING SYSTEMS: All GCYL officials and Bulldogs staff will defer to a venue's detection and alert system when present. Known venues include Madeira HS, Mariemont HS, Milford HS, and other public schools in the area that are integrated with the NWS alert system. In the event that a system malfunction (or if "oversensitivity" is suspected), the officials and representatives from both teams may confer to determine the safest plan of action for all participants in attendance.



Lightning Action Plan:

MONITOR changing weather conditions continually (or assign the task to a volunteer that is able to stay in constant contact).

If lightning and other weather threats are very close or imminently approaching, MAKE THE CALL FOR ALL IN ATTENDANCE TO SEEK SHELTER in a SAFE BUILDING, defined as: 1) a building with structural walls, 2) built upon a foundation, and 3) containing both plumbing and electrical lines - which serves to deflect and/or diffuse a strike into negative ground.

IMMEDIATELY COMMUNICATE an emergency via all means available: PA System, text, email, team app, or direct verbal address to all participants in attendance.

At Seton Field, specifically AVOID the football shed and the pavilion. The optimal shelters on campus are the school building and the church. If unavailable, advise sheltering in vehicles as the next best alternative.

At Madeira HS Field, specifically AVOID using the space under the bleachers as shelter from lightning. The optimal shelter on campus is any space inside the school building, including the gym, auditorium, or weight room. If unavailable, advise sheltering in vehicles as the next best alternative.

As a VISITING TEAM, seek the advice of the home team or venue officials and defer to their safety policies. If policies are unavailable, or if advice is questionable or non-present, TAKE CHARGE AND MAKE THE CALL FOR THE SAFETY OF ALL IN ATTENDANCE. Always err on the side of safety!



Tornado Action Plan:

ALERT LEVEL 1

Tornado Watch: "Conditions are favorable for tornado formation". Outdoor activity may continue so long as weather conditions are continually monitored and an action plan can be immediately enacted. Be aware and alert that lightning precautions may take earlier precedence

ALERT LEVEL 2

Tornado Warning: "Possible tornado on the ground, or radar evidence of a tornado in the area". Based on the warning perimeter, all outdoor activities must cease and all participants are advised to seek immediate shelter

ALERT Tornado Emergency: "Tornado confirmed and actively threatening in the immediate threatening in the immediate area." All outdoor activities in LEVEL 3 the vicinity must cease and all participants are directed to seek immediate shelter

When necessary, MAKE THE CALL FOR ALL IN ATTENDANCE TO SEEK SHELTER in a SAFE BUILDING, defined as: 1) a building with structural walls, 2) built upon a foundation, and 3) containing both plumbing and electrical lines - which serves to deflect and/or diffuse a strike into negative ground. Avoid windows and close doors when possible.

IMMEDIATELY COMMUNICATE an emergency via all means available: PA System, text, email, team app, or direct verbal address to all participants in attendance.

CALLING 9-1-1

IN ANY SCENARIO, BE PREPARED TO MAKE AN EFFECTIVE CALL...

 Call (or direct a caller) 9-1-1 immediately to activate an emergency response. If possible, the caller should stay on the line until emegency responders arrive. In a serious situation, request that the dispatch supervisor or a police officer join the 911 call



- Clearly state the address and be descriptive about the exact location of the emergency ("main field", "North stadium bleachers", etc.)
- Identify yourself by name and state that you are in a position to address and/or help to manage the crowd
- Be aware and alert to those who may need assistance in an emergency situation, such as elderly, handicapped, etc. and appoint personnel to assist if evacuation is necessary

FIRE

- Call 9-1-1
- Activate the building fire alarm and notify occupants



- Evacuate the building and/or clear the area around the fire. Be aware of the route from which fire department crews will arrive and clear onlookers from the surrounding area
- Attempt to use a fire extinguisher if available. Use the P.A.S.S. method:

PULL pin out of handle
AIM at base of flames
SQUEEZE trigger all of the way
SWEEP back and forth at base of flames

URGENT SITUATION:

(suspicious person, package, activity, or bomb threat)



- Call 9-1-1
 - STAY ON THE LINE and request that the dispatch supervisor or a police officer join the 911 call
 - REPORT updates/changes continually
- Use discretion if necessary so as not to escalate a situation with a potentially violent suspect
- Inform staff of the situation and determine the best course of immediate action. Different situations may call for varying approaches:
 - PUBLICIZE the situation for the safety of those in attendance using all means available (PA system, verbal address, text, team app, etc.)
 - DISCRETION may be advised for some situations. SEEK ADVICE from the 911 operator if unsure
 - EVACUATE all participants from the area.
 Appoint personnel to MANAGE a safe,
 orderly operation using volunteers at exits and bottleneck points
 - SHELTER IN PLACE (difficult in an open outdoor venue). Seek dispatcher advice
- If a BOMB THREAT exists, immediately make a public announcement to turn off all electronics including cell phones
- DIRECT personnel to monitor and manage venue exits and bottleneck points
- COOPERATE with and assist police if requested

ACTIVE SHOOTER/ OTHER WEAPON





- STAY ON THE LINE and request that the dispatch supervisor or a police officer join the 911 call
- REPORT updates/changes continually
- Inform staff of the situation and determine the best course of immediate action. Different situations may call for varying approaches:



AVOID - Evacuate participants as soon and as safely as possible

DENY - Lock or block doors and gates, turn off lights, silence phones

DEFEND - Distract, Attack, Subdue

- When safe, DIRECT personnel to monitor and manage venue exits and bottleneck points
- When safe, DIRECT personnel to assist those in need, such as elderly, handicapped, etc.

UPON POLICE ARRIVAL, ALL PERSONNEL STAND DOWN AND ALLOW CONTROL OF THE SCENE TO LAW ENFORCEMENT

- COOPERATE with police officers and assist if requested
- IDENTIFY YOURSELF as the caller and/or as the person in charge. State that you are able to address the public by PA, phone, text, etc. if requested
